



Engaging Adult Learners Remotely

TECH TOOLS FOR ADVISING AND COACHING

During the changing and challenging circumstances of the current COVID-19 shutdowns, it's important to connect to learners. Advisors can use a variety of tools to offer learners support, share community resources and encourage their progress with learning goals. It is more important than ever to choose tech tools that help learners feel connected to you, as well as other learners. The resources in this handout are free unless stated otherwise.

GENERAL TIPS:



Ask yourself these questions before using a new tool: What is your intended purpose for the tool? Is it easy for you to use? Is it easy for your learners to use? Does it achieve the intended purpose?



Put supports in place to teach the digital literacy skills needed for each tool. Link to tutorials, post a video of you using or navigating the tool, or introduce only essential parts of the tool.



When possible, choose tech tools that relate to learner goals. Learners whose career goals require administrative skills could learn google calendar and google drive and documents to be able to collaborate with coworkers in the future.



Build on skills and tools students are already familiar with. Many parents of K12 children will be familiar with Remind. New American learners may know WhatsApp.



TOOLS TO KEEP IN TOUCH

This sampling of tools can be used to stay in touch, nudge, remind learners of upcoming dates, meetings and assignments, and post scheduling changes.



Remind

- Remind allows you to send messages to different learner groups without worrying about sharing your personal information.
- Option to create class contact lists, share documents or links, review who has seen your messages, and allow recipients to chat or not.

"I use the remind app to communicate with students, mostly for tracking attendance. It is quick and requires only a short text from both sides."



 Facebook can be used for announcements, updates, for private class groups, or individual messaging, depending on the regulations of your program and privacy setting.



Google Voice Google voice can be used to call and text without using your personal number.

"I love Google Voice because it allows students and me to talk and text without using my personal phone number. It is free with a limit: you can text to 7 phone numbers max."



- WhatsApp is a free text messaging service, especially useful for immigrant and refugee learners who may be most familiar with this format.
- Learner groups can be created.
- Personal numbers are shared on this platform.

- WeChat is an instant messaging platform
- WeChat allows you to create group chats, send photos and files, voice notes and video.



Weebly

- Weebly is a user-friendly, free website builder that allows you to share a large amount of resources with learners in one place.
- Website information can include: Community resources, career center information, job postings, online learning links and career planning information.

- On Google Drive, learners and advisors can share documents, collaborate on editing resumes or other work, and 'turn in' assignments anytime.
- Google docs. and google sheets are other tools for collaborating and tracking progress.



Padlet is a user-friendly message board platform, where learners can answer questions, post responses, share links, read messages from their peers, and respond accordingly.

- The Career Information System is a comprehensive, online career and education exploration and planning system that allows learners to compile a portfolio of their information and personal progress.
- Learners can share portfolio access with advisors, add notes on their self-assessment results, and use checklists to track portfolio progress.
