



Tech Tools for Advising and Coaching: Engaging Learners Remotely

During the changing and challenging circumstances of the current COVID-19 shutdowns, it's important to connect to learners. Advisors can use a variety of tools to offer learners support, share community resources and encourage their progress with learning goals. It is more important than ever to choose tech tools that help learners feel connected to you, as well as other learners. The resources in this handout are free unless stated otherwise.

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	 General tips: Ask your self these questions before using a new tool: What is your intended purpose for the tool? Is it easy for you to use? Is it easy for your learners to use? Does it achieve the intended purpose? Put supports in place to teach the digital literacy skills needed for each tool. For example, link to tutorials, post a video of you using or navigating the tool, or introduce only essential parts of the tool. When possible, choose tech tools that relate to learner goals. For example, learners whose career goals require administrative and collaboration skills can learn how to use google calendar and google drive. Build on skills and tools students are already familiar with. For example, many parents of K12 children will be familiar with Remind. New American learners may know WhatsApp.
	Tools for Staying in Touch This sampling of tools can be used to stay in touch, nudge, remind learners of upcoming dates, meetings and assignments, and post scheduling changes and cancellations.
9	 https://www.remind.com/ Remind allows you to send messages to different learner groups without worrying about sharing your personal information. Option to create class contact lists, share documents or links, review who has seen your messages, and allow recipients to chat or not.
X Sta	 https://www.weebly.com/ Weebly is a user-friendly, free website building tool that allows you to share a large amount of resources with learners in one place. Website information can include: Community resources, career center information, job postings, links to online learning as well as education and career planning information.
C	 https://voice.google.com/ and google hangouts Google voice can be used to call and text while not using your personal number. Google hangouts can be used in many different ways to connect with learners over video.
	 https://www.whatsapp.com/ Whatsapp is a free text messaging service, especially useful for immigrant and refugee learners who may be most familiar with this format. Learner groups can be created. Personal numbers are shared through this platform.
	 facebook.com Facebook can be used for announcements, updates, for private class groups, or individual messaging, depending on the regulations of your program and privacy setting.

Career Information System Previously MassCIS	 https://portal.masscis.intocareers.org/ The Career Information System is a comprehensive, online career and education exploration and planning system that allows learners to compile a portfolio of their information and personal progress. Learners can share portfolio access with advisors, add notes on their selfassessment results, and use checklists to track portfolio progress. 	
Google Drive	 <u>https://www.google.com/drive/</u> On google drive, learners and advisors can share documents, collaborate on editing resumes or other work, and 'turn in' assignments anytime. Google docs. and google sheets are other tools for collaborating and tracking progress. 	
padlet	 <u>https://padlet.com/</u> Padlet is a user-friendly sharing and collaboration platform where learners can post responses, updates, share resources, read the words of others, and respond accordingly.
